COURSES:

FILM STUDIES: One-Week Short Filmmaking Three-Week Intensive Filmmaking

Both courses are composed of two different modules. In the first part of the course, international students will be introduced to the basic techniques of shooting and filmmaking. Student will also be given a basic overview of the historical theories of Cinema. One-Week Short Filmmaking and Three-Week Intensive Filmmaking workshops are offered in order to give students the opportunity to simultaneously study the audiovisual basics and to start shooting with real technical instruments. During the second part of the course, faculty members facilitate the creation of a professional audiovisual product, utilizing students' talents and ideas to give life to an original program. Intensive Filmmaking, unlike Short Filmmaking, allows students the opportunity to overcome real production issues and explains how to find solutions to these. Lastly, international students will see their final outcomes on DVD or directly on the screen. In the last part of both courses, Marconi University faculty will take international students on a guided tour of Rome, the capital of cinema in Italy, to see where cinematographic art was born. From the Trevi Fountain – where Federico Fellini gave life to his uncontested masterpiece La Dolce Vita – to the Spanish Steps, where Audrey Hepburn and Gregory Peck paid tribute to the immortal city of Rome during the shooting of Vacanze Romane, as well as other sites of interests such as Cinecittà studio in Rome.

One-Week Short Filmmaking

A perfect course for anyone wanting to get a 'feel' of filmmaking. A combination of film workshop and group instruction, this one-week course has been designed to provide a fun,







hands-on introduction to filmmaking. International students will learn the fundamentals of directing, editing and sound and will be equipped with basic technical knowledge in each of these areas. During the program students will gain a comprehensive range of practical production skills that focus on creative development, writing, directing, production and editing.

Three-Week Intensive Filmmaking

Diverse from Short Filmmaking, the Three-Week Intensive Filmmaking course aims to provide a foundation of all aspects of practical filmmaking from concept to delivery, covering the creative, technical, theoretical, ethical and logistical aspects of the filmmaking industry. It focuses on giving students a working knowledge of film grammar and an understanding of established industry conventions, explaining as well some of the basic tools to analyzing moving images on digital camera. Further, it aims to facilitate student self-reflection and self-development. The course then moves on to actual production where students will work in groups to create a small digital film, allowing international students to put their knowledge into practice. Students can take part in a series of filming and editing exercises conceived to facilitate learning through practical experience on a true TV Set. Students will write, direct, and edit professional audiovisual products or help produce a short movie to be viewed by selected faculty members. At the end of the course faculty members will then choose the best short movie of the class. This course requires a full-time, daily commitment from the student, including three hours of classroom instruction, one hour of screenings (during the second part of the course), and one hour of reading homework and workshop projects outside of class and on weekends.
